

**Clear Creek Azalea**
Rhododendron 'Clear Creek'

Height: 8 feet

Spread: 6 feet

Description:

Large, fragrant yellow blooms with white centers adorn this lovely variety in mid-spring; an accent or border shrub that will definitely stand out; heat tolerant; absolutely must have well-drained, highly acidic and organic soil

Ornamental Features

Clear Creek Azalea is covered in stunning clusters of fragrant yellow trumpet-shaped flowers with pink throats and white centers at the ends of the branches in mid spring. It has dark green deciduous foliage. The glossy oval leaves turn tan and in fall.

Landscape Attributes

Clear Creek Azalea is an open multi-stemmed deciduous shrub with an upright spreading habit of growth. Its relatively coarse texture can be used to stand it apart from other landscape plants with finer foliage.

This is a relatively low maintenance shrub, and should only be pruned after flowering to avoid removing any of the current season's flowers. Gardeners should be aware of the following characteristic(s) that may warrant special consideration;

- Insects
- Disease

- Accent
- Mass Planting

Planting & Growing

Clear Creek Azalea will grow to be about 8 feet tall at maturity, with a spread of 6 feet. It tends to be a little leggy, with a typical clearance of 1 foot from the ground, and is suitable for planting under power lines. It grows at a slow rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for 40 years or more.

This shrub does best in full sun to partial shade. You may want to keep it away from hot, dry locations that receive direct afternoon sun or which get reflected sunlight, such as against the south side of a white wall. It requires an evenly moist well-drained soil for optimal growth, but will die in standing water. This plant should be periodically fertilized throughout the active growing season with a specially-formulated acidic fertilizer. It is very fussy about its soil conditions and must have rich, acidic soils to ensure success, and is subject to chlorosis (yellowing) of the foliage in alkaline soils. It is somewhat tolerant of urban pollution, and will benefit from being planted in a relatively sheltered location. Consider applying a thick mulch around the root zone in winter to protect it in exposed locations or colder microclimates. This particular variety is an interspecific hybrid.
