

**Blagon Ginkgo**
Ginkgo biloba 'Blagon'

Description:

A true 150 million year old relic with distinctive fan-shaped leaves; this variety features a narrowly conical to columnar habit of growth and radiant golden yellow fall color; does not produce fruit; an excellent articulation tree for smaller landscapes

Ornamental Features

Blagon Ginkgo is primarily valued in the landscape for its rigidly columnar form. It has emerald green deciduous foliage. The fan-shaped leaves turn outstanding shades of gold and yellow in the fall.

Landscape Attributes

Blagon Ginkgo is a deciduous tree with a strong central leader and a narrowly upright and columnar growth habit. Its average texture blends into the landscape, but can be balanced by one or two finer or coarser trees or shrubs for an effective composition.

This is a relatively low maintenance tree, and is best pruned in late winter once the threat of extreme cold has passed. Deer don't particularly care for this plant and will usually leave it alone in favor of tastier treats. It has no significant negative characteristics.

Blagon Ginkgo is recommended for the following landscape applications;

- Accent
- Shade
- Vertical Accent

Planting & Growing

Blagon Ginkgo will grow to be about 30 feet tall at maturity, with a spread of 7 feet. It has a high canopy with a typical clearance of 6 feet from the ground, and should not be planted underneath power lines. As it matures, the lower branches of this tree can be strategically removed to create a high enough canopy to support unobstructed human traffic underneath. It grows at a slow rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live to a ripe old age of 150 years or more; think of this as a heritage tree for future generations!

This tree should only be grown in full sunlight. It is very adaptable to both dry and moist locations, and should do just fine under average home landscape conditions. This plant does not require much in the way of fertilizing once established. It is not particular as to soil type or pH, and is able to handle environmental salt. It is highly tolerant of urban pollution and will even thrive in inner city environments. Consider applying a thick mulch around the root zone in winter to protect it in exposed locations or colder microclimates. This is a selected variety of a species not originally from North America.
